FOR EARLY FACULTY

Early investigators apply first with a concept outline, pitched to the NSF either in email to a program officer or by way of [ProSPCT](#).

[Center for Retirement Research – Steven H. Sandell Grant Program – Boston College](#). Open to junior faculty (within 7 years of receiving their Ph.D.) from all disciplines to pursue cutting-edge projects on retirement or disability issues. **DUE April 30.** Applicants must demonstrate that their proposal focuses on at least one of SSA's [research focal areas](#):

- Disparities by race, ethnicity, and sex;
- Addressing barriers to disability program and SSI program participation;
- Economic security of program applicants and beneficiaries;
- Understanding service needs;
- Understanding communication needs; and
- Addressing employment barriers for people with disabilities.

[CAREER: The Faculty Early Career Development \(CAREER\) Program](#) The Career opportunity is NSF-wide and it supports social science faculty early in their careers for five years, \$400,000 overall. Activities pursued by early-career faculty should build a firm foundation for a lifetime of leadership in integrating education and research. Before preparing a CAREER proposal, PIs are strongly encouraged to contact their disciplinary Program Officer or the appropriate CAREER contact to discuss budget requests for their proposed CAREER activities, and typical funding

PRAx

[Challenge America – National Endowment for the Arts](#) offers “support primarily to small organizations for projects in all artistic disciplines that extend the reach of the arts to groups/communities with rich and dynamic artistic and cultural contributions to share that are underserved.” The program features an abbreviated application, a standardized \$10,000 grant amount, and a robust structure of technical assistance to facilitate entry to NEA funding opportunities. 1:1 match required. This category may be a good entry point for organizations that are new to applying for federal funding. First-time applicants to the NEA, as well as previous NEA applicants who have not been recommended for funding in any of the three most recent Fiscal Years (FYs 2022, 2023, or 2024) in any of the following grant programs, are eligible to apply: • Grants for Arts Projects, • Research Grants in the Arts, or • Our Town. **Due April 25.**

[Media Projects – NEH](#) – Development and Production Grants (two levels) support radio programs, podcasts, documentary films and documentary film series that engage general audiences with humanities ideas in creative and appealing ways. **New application guidelines should be posted May 14. SCHOOL OF PSYCHOLOGICAL SCIENCE

Institutional Research Training Grant – Ruth L. Kirschstein National Research Services Award (NRSA) T32 “The National Institutes of Health (NIH) will award Ruth L. Kirschstein National Research Service Award (NRSA) Institutional Research Training Grants (T32) to eligible, domestic institutions to develop and/or enhance predoctoral and postdoctoral research training, including short-term research training, to help ensure that a diverse and highly trained workforce is available to meet the needs of the Nation’s biomedical, behavioral, and clinical research agenda.” **Due May 25**. Five years of support and continuing.

NIMH Short Courses for Mental Health Related Research – NIH R25 Courses for Skills Development “are expected to facilitate the development of a cadre of investigators with the requisite scientific research skills to advance the mission of the NIMH. Each short course is expected to include both didactics and hands-on research experiences. Participants are limited to graduate/medical students, medical residents, postdoctoral scholars, and/or early-career investigators.” **Due May 25**. \$200k in direct support available each year for up to five years. “This FOA will support the development, implementation, and evaluation of innovative and interactive short courses for scientists interested in learning state-of-the-art skills needed to conduct cutting-edge mental health research.”



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Alcohol Research-Related Resource Award – NIH R24 The purpose of the Resource-Related Research Projects (R24) grant is to support investigator-initiated resources designed to provide materials and services to support and advance biomedical, behavioral, and social sciences research on a national basis. An R24 resource grant mechanism is a non-hypothesis-driven activity to provide data, materials, tools, or services that are essential to making timely, high quality, and cost-efficient progress in a field. Hypothesis-driven research applications should not be submitted in response to this program announcement but to another mechanism that encourages this type of research. Resources should be designed to provide services to the broad alcohol research community and should not be limited by any specific regional focus. The resource should be available to any qualified investigator, and should be highly quality controlled, and not duplicate resources available commercially or through other sources. **Due May 25.**

NICHD Research Education Programs – NIH R25 The goal of the program is to support educational activities that complement and/or enhance the training of a workforce to meet the nation’s biomedical, behavioral and clinical research needs. This FOA will support creative educational activities with a primary focus on *Courses for Skills Development* and/or *Research Experiences*. The National Institute of Child and Health Development and the National Center for Advancing Translational Sciences are components of represented orgs under this call. **Due May 25.**

Addressing Health and Healthcare Disparities among Sexual and Gender Minority Populations – NIH R01 The purpose of this Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) is to support innovative observational and intervention-based research to identify and characterize the pathways and mechanisms through which health and health care disparities occur among sexual and gender minority populations of minoritized racial/ethnic and socio-economic statuses. \$500,000 available. **DUE June 5.**

Health and Healthcare Disparities Among Persons Living with Disabilities – NIH R01. Represented by multiple institutes and offices including National Institute on Minority Health and Health Disparities (NIMHD); NI on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA); NI on Drug Abuse (NIDA); the Office of Behavioral and Social Sciences Research (OBSSR), the R01 with clinical trials optional provides unlimited (typically not more than \$500k per year) direct costs for “innovative research that focuses on the health (e.g., conditions, outcomes, trajectories, etc.) and healthcare (e.g., modalities systemic or structural factors, access/barriers, service delivery, care quality, utilization, etc.) of persons living with disabilities and the intersections with race and ethnicity, and SES. Research focused on intersections with sexual and gender minority self-identification, and living in underserved rural locations are also of interest.” **Due June 6.**



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Behavioral Interventions Scholars – Administration for Children and Families, DHHS

Behavioral Interventions Scholars awards support dissertation research by advanced graduate students in the field of behavioral science.

Behavioral science seeks to understand how individuals make decisions and what drives their behavior, drawing on the fields of behavioral, social, and cognitive psychology; economics; and other social sciences. Students' research supported through these awards must be related to programs and policies that affect children, adults, and families with low incomes. These awards build the body of research that applies a behavioral science lens to social services and support faculty mentorship of high-quality doctoral students. **DUE June 7. \$20,000 - \$25,000 available each year (12 – 24 months).**

Aging Research Dissertation Awards to Promote Diversity – NIH NIA R36. The National Institute on Aging (NIA) invites R36 applications to support senior graduate students with Aging Research Dissertation Awards to Promote Diversity. These awards provide funding to support graduate students from diverse backgrounds, including those from groups underrepresented in the biomedical and behavioral sciences, in finishing their dissertations. Specifically, the award supports dissertation research costs of students enrolled in accredited research doctoral programs in the United States. **DUE June 16.** Funding includes a generous salary, dissertation credit hours (but not full tuition and fees) and generous support for other related costs.

Evidence for Action (E4A) – Robert Wood Johnson Foundation calls for proposals that “evaluate specific interventions (e.g., policies, programs, practices) that have the potential to counteract the harms of structural and systemic racism” and improve the health and well-being of persons to have experienced inequities. **Open Deadline.** The application will require close consultation with the OSU Foundation. Generous materials provided by the sponsor. E4A averages three years of support.

Arnold Ventures Evidence and Evaluation seeks to support evidence bearing research and solutions for the nation’s most pressing problems. Four areas of focus present different opportunities: **Higher Education** projects need to focus on equity gaps for student success; **Infrastructure** is an “initiative that supports research, policy development and advocacy” to scale up affordable housing, transportation, climate solutions; **Contraception** supports evaluations on policies’ impacts on access and barriers; **Public Finance** is an initiative to “advance budget policies that both promote fiscal stability in government and advance Americans’ economic opportunity, mobility, and security.” **LOI is Due June 6. [Humanities Initiatives at Colleges and Universities – NEH](#) strengthen the teaching and study of the humanities at institutions of higher education by developing new or enhancing existing programs, resources (including those in digital format), or courses that explore, interpret, and preserve the diversity of human cultures, ideas, and practices, past and present. Projects must address a core topic or set of themes drawn from **humanities areas such as history, philosophy, religion, literature, or humanities-informed composition and writing skills**. NEH welcomes applications for projects that are modest in scope, duration, and budget, as well as applications for expansive, long-term projects. **Due May 7**.

[Avant-Garde Masters Grants for Film Preservation – National Film Preservation Foundation.](#)

This grant supports the preservation of a film or films by a single filmmaker or from a cinematic group significant to the development of avant-garde film in America. Works made within the last twenty years are not eligible. Applications should show how the proposed titles have made a significant contribution to American experimental film or, if the works are lesser known today, demonstrate how the films will contribute to a better understanding of avant-garde film history. Proposals must also explain why the proposed films are in need of preservation and include plans detailing how the films will be made available to the public and the scholarly community. \$5,000 - \$50,000 available. **Register by May 1; Application Deadline: June 7**.

Fall, is designed for producers working in the nonfiction space.
