## NMC 410 Internship Information

### **Eligibility for NMC 410 Internship Credit**

In order to complete an internship for NMC credit, you must be a DCA major, have completed 15 NMC credits, and be at a junior or senior standing. If you meet these requirements, please contact New Media Communications' Academic Advisor, Danny Gruss (daniel.gruss@oregonstate.edu), to discuss internship eligibility for NMC 410 credit. Students are required to secure their own internship placements. NMC can connect you with resources to explore possible internships.

### **Internship Proposal Form**

Please contact New Media Communications' Academic Advisor, Danny Gruss (daniel.gruss@oregonstate.edu). He can lead you through the application process for NMC 410 Internships and provide you with the proper forms.

### **Selecting an Appropriate Number of Credits**

NMC 410 can be taken as one advanced level class, 3 credits reach the threshold of "one class." For BFA students NMC 410 counts as a production class. One credit of 410 is equal to a minimum 30 hours of work or three hours per week in a 10-week term. Credit for the internship depends on the specific nature of the internship and the learning outcomes negotiated between the student, site supervisor, and approving faculty member. ### **Registering for NMC 410 Credit**

NMC 410 requires an override for registration. First step is for you and your approving faculty member to ascertain that the proposal form is correct. After this occurs your approving faculty member will initiate the override process.

### **During the Internship**

Conduct yourself professionally. You are a representative of your peers, the New Media Communications department, and Oregon State University.

### **Receiving a Grade**

In order to receive a grade for NMC 410, you need:

1. An Internship Evaluation Form completed by your site supervisor. This form should be submitted directly from your site supervisor to your NMC approving faculty member.
2. A paper in consultation with your professor reflecting on the internship:  
How did you meet your learning objectives? How was your experience similar/dissimilar to what you expected? What skills, knowledge, experience did you gain? How will you use what you've learned in the future? What did you learn about yourself and your career options? What should NMC know about your experience for future interns?
