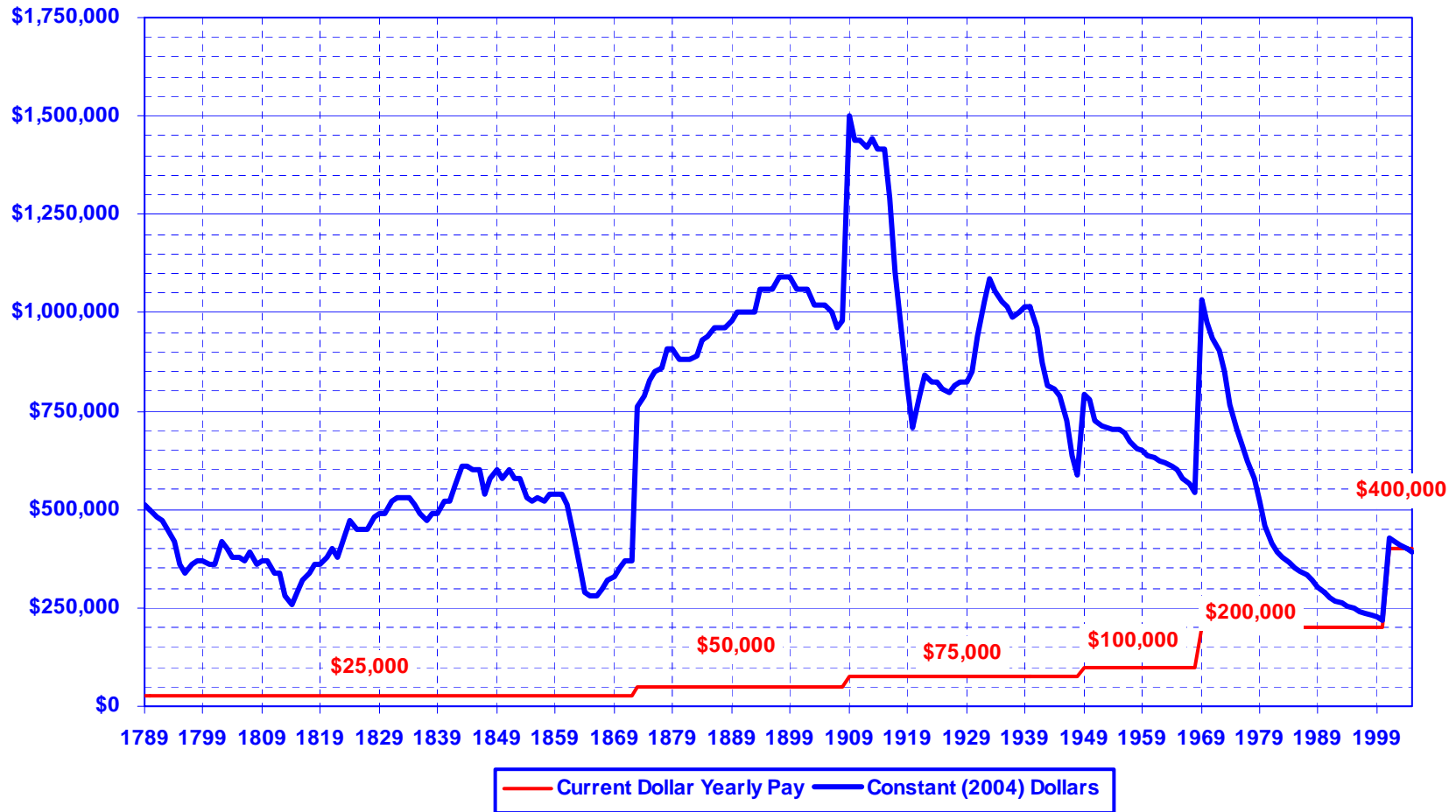


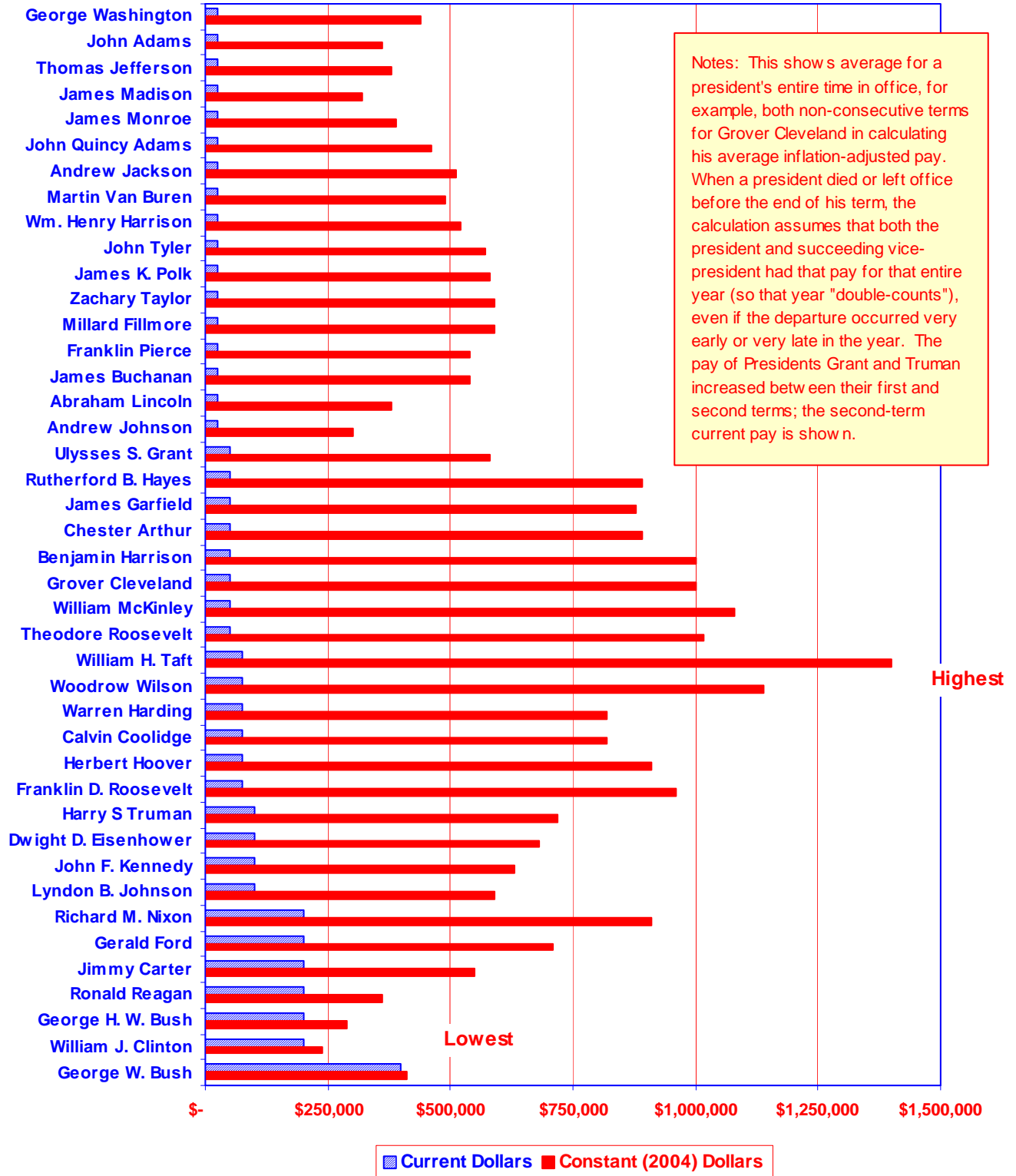

in Current and Constant (2004) dollars

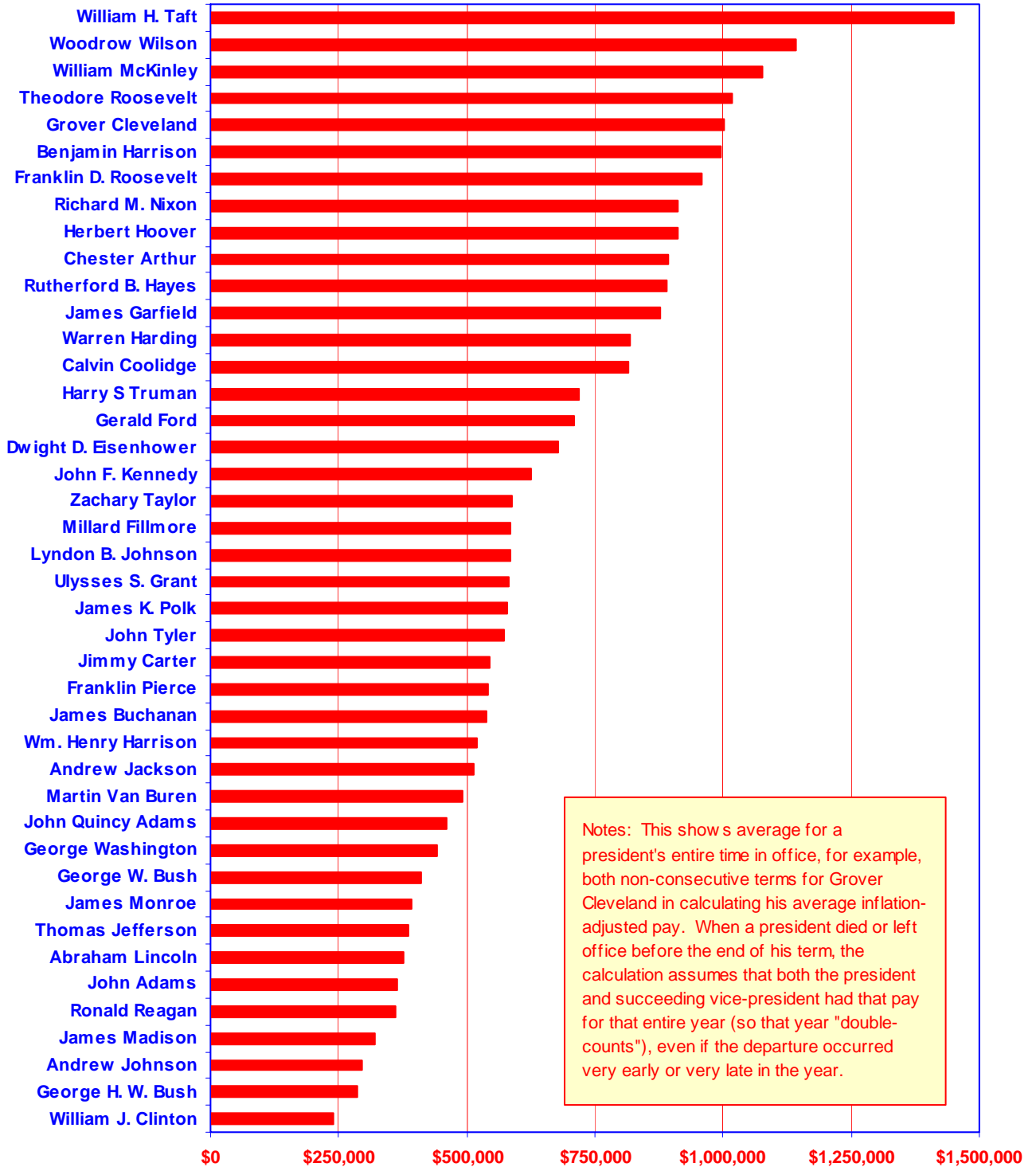


Data prior to 1913 should be considered approximations. Starting in 1949 presidents also have had a \$50,000 per year expense account, worth nearly \$400,000 that year in dollars of 2004. Average Pay of US Presidents in Inflation-adjusted Dollars, In Current and Constant (2004) Dollars

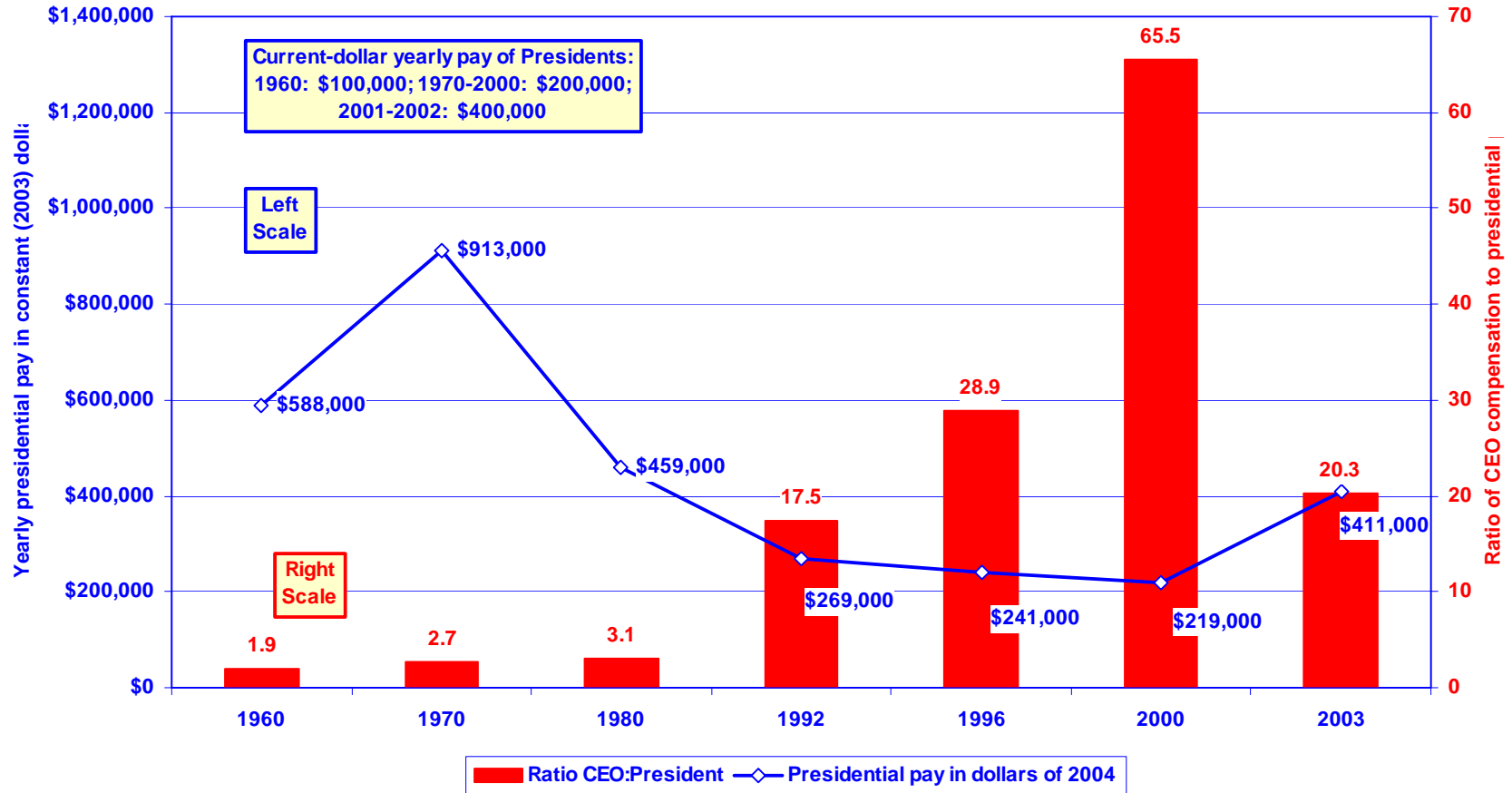


Ranked Average Pay of US Presidents in Inflation-adjusted Dollars, from High (Taft) to Low (Clinton)



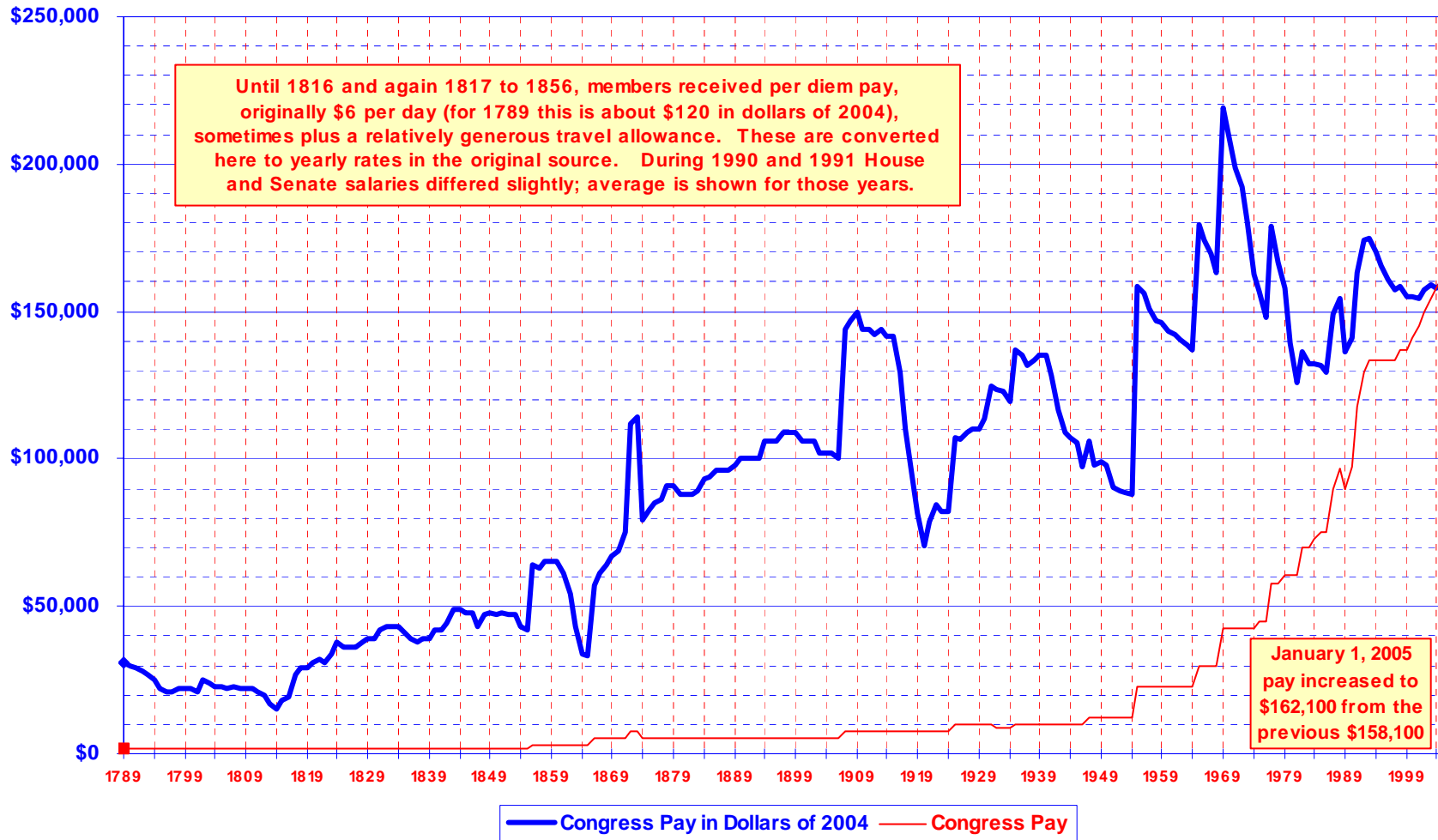

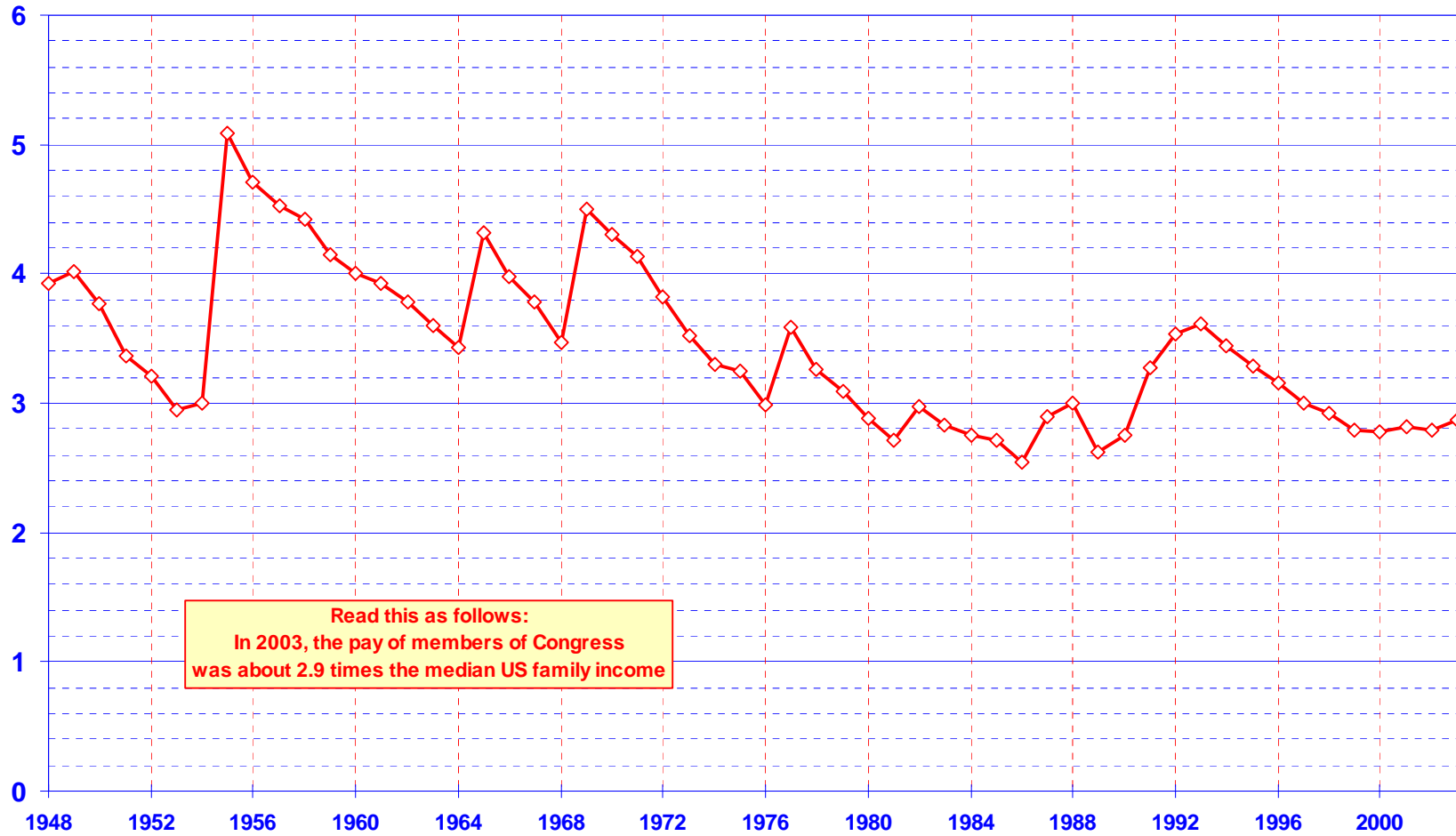

Yearly Pay of Members of Congress 1789 to 2005, in Current and Constant (2004) Dollars



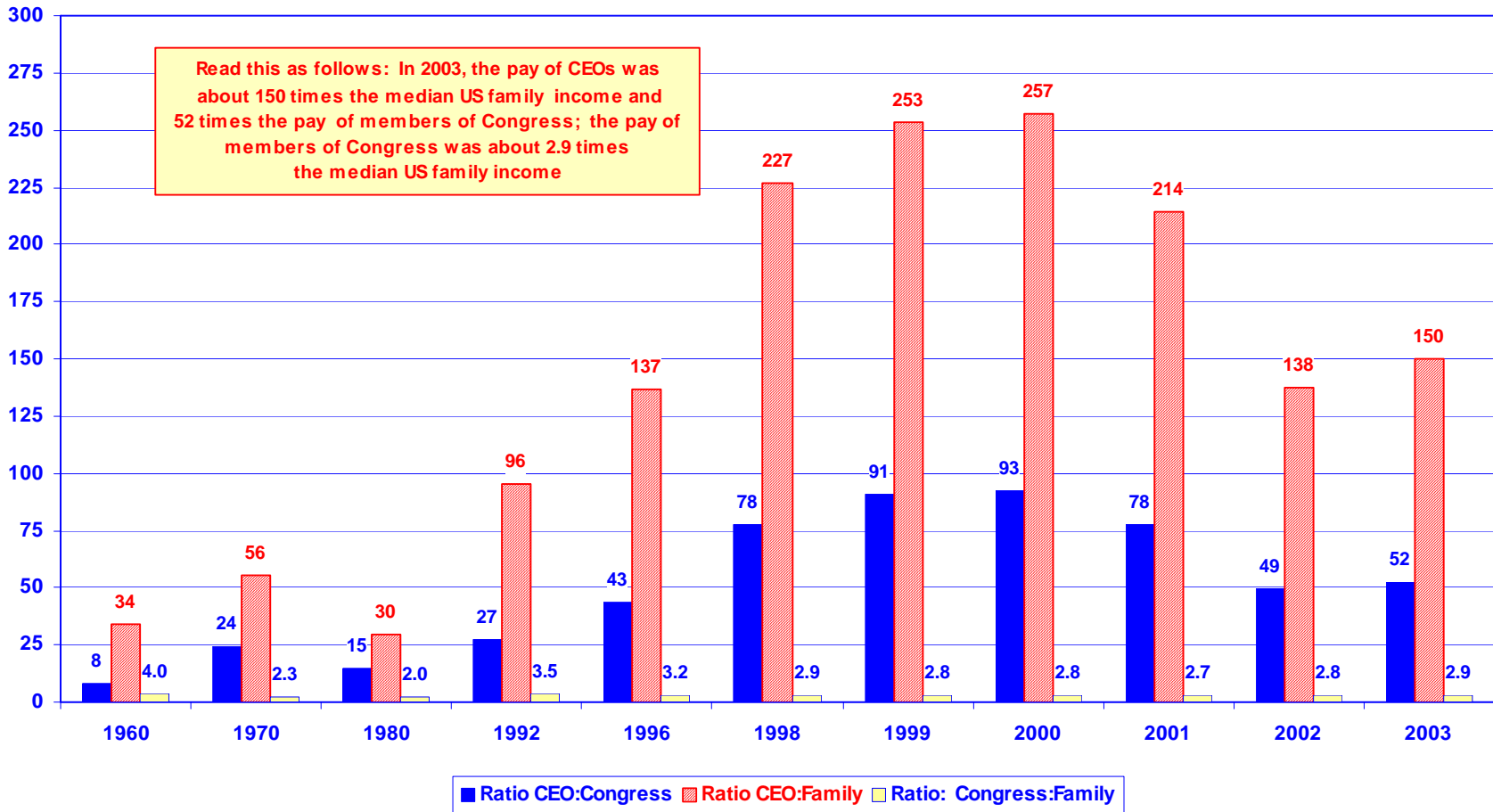
